









Background

The United Nations General Assembly adopted resolution A/RES/47/193 of 22 December 1992 by which 22 March of each year was declared World Day for Water, to be observed starting in 1993, in conformity with the recommendations of the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED) contained in Chapter 18 (Fresh Water Resources) of Agenda 21. The World Water Day is held annually on 22 March as a means of focusing attention on the importance of freshwater and advocating for the sustainable management of freshwater resources. The objectives of the World Water Day are:

- To celebrate water and raising awareness of the 2.2 billion people living without access to safe water.
- To encourage member states to take action to tackle the global water crisis and achieving Sustainable Development Goal 6: water and sanitation for all by 2030.
- To provide an opportunity to the key players and stakeholders in the water and sanitation sector to learn more about water related issues, to be inspired to tell others and take action to make a difference.

The theme of World Water Day 2021 is "valuing water". Valuing Water does not limit to the economic aspect of pricing of water, it stresses that cultural, ecological, social, spiritual aspects of water are taken into account in decisions on water. In celebrating the World Water Day, UNESCO Regional Office for Southern Africa in collaboration with Waternet Trust, will hold a regional online roundtable discussion with a variety of players in the field in order to gather opinions and comments about water and what it means to them. The aim is to understand how people value water – whether it is economically, socially, culturally or in other ways – how it plays a role in their different fields.
