Study plan

For a total of 120 ECTS, the Master program offers **core courses** (72 ECTS) and electives (24 ECTS), allowing students to tailor the program to their interests.

Regular duration: 4 semesters; Maximal duration: 6 semesters.

The Master thesis or internship report (24 ECTS) concludes the program.

One of the Masters programs with the most electives; does not offer a specialization.


Formerly STAREG

- 86% were employed, in a 2016 survey
